Harvest the Power

The aim of this course is not only to identify and strengthen one's leadership skills, but to understand how leadership can serve both as an offering to others and as a means of self-discovery and fullness. Some topics addressed over the six. 90-minute sessions include:



- (1) Finding and affirming the spiritual and emotional gifts we each bring to leadership.
- (2) Identifying congregational and organizational culture. Which voices and perspectives are at the center of organizational life? Which are on the margins? Why does this matter?
- (3) Turning points. What leads an organization to and through them?
- (4) Caring for ourselves and each other. How can leadership be sustainable without causing burnout?
- (5) Viewing conflict as a means to indicate questions needing attention in the larger organization.

<u>Harvest the Power will begin the first week of March and run for six consecutive weeks</u>. The availability of participants indicated on the registration form will guide weekling meeting day and time. If interested in participating please <u>register</u> by February 19th. The Shared Pulpit

At the foundation of *The Shared Pulpit* are questions like what is worship? What makes worship meaningful? How are my personal stories and experience spiritually significant and impactful. Beyond looking at worship conceptually, *The Shared Pulpit* walks participants through (and helps them write) a sermon or homily of their own. The program is a unique opportunity to delve into one's own spirituality, connect deeply with other participants, and help sustain CVUU's worship offerings.

The Shared Pulpit comprises eight sessions that are workshop and feedback based. Because of a longer meeting time and writing required between sessions, there will be several weeks between meetings. The program will run from March through June.
